

2019 MAJOR – Sociolinguistics

(Qualifying Major for Bachelor of Social Science with the degree of Bachelor of Laws)

Sociolinguistics is a key sub discipline of Linguistics. After completing the first year foundational unit that is required of any student studying linguistics in the Department, in the second year of the Sociolinguistics major, students begin to specialise, with the required 200 level unit (LING219) introducing them to core areas of Sociolinguistics, while the option set at 200 level offers a choice of units relevant to social scientists with an interest in the workings of language and the ways language varies in social and cultural contexts. The 300 level units offer a range of relevant special interest topics, with the key unit being the required Capstone unit. This unit concentrates on bilingualism, a vital area of knowledge for any sociolinguistics graduate wanting employment or future study in the field in an increasingly multicultural Australia, as well as in many countries around the world.
